

whole of humanity, by arriving at the simple though erroneous dictum that 'the joys of the flesh are bad.'

As a disjointed, discordant person, he is the possessor of a physical and mental constitution in which "his passions are in a state of disharmony, discord, and violent disunion or anarchy." He may be "apparently in good health, but still suspects life and casts the blight of his distrust upon it." "This is a type of man who, like Socrates, is conscious of having a whole host of evil demons pent up in his breast, and who has had neither the traditions of culture nor power of control, nor the necessary antecedents of regular living and healthy harmony, which would be favourable to imposing a measure upon his instincts." "His cure for these pent up demons, in the absence of aristocratic taste and instinctive discrimination, is inhibition, prohibition—the blue ribbon of abstinence. It is his only remedy; his one resource, if he would survive. Instinctively he joins hands with the first kind of Puritan—the 'sick man'—who brings him his morality cut and dried."

And thus both sorts of Puritans starting from different standpoints arrive at the same goal. Both, "like the Long Parliament of the seventeenth century, want to make men virtuous by legislation and by forbidding all those things which, while they make life worth living, do not belong to the category of pleasures in which the members themselves could indulge without making hogs of themselves." Both kinds of Puritan agree in suspecting life, and in casting a slur upon even the healthy manifestation of her most fundamental instincts.

The Puritan still lives both in public and private life. English legislation, especially during the last ten years, has reflected very strongly the Puritanical tyranny and distrust of vigorous life manifested in the legislation of the Long Parliament and of New England; not always it must be said in fairness, but in the main it is so. But where it has on rare occasions departed from the distrust of life, this has not been due to the virtuous efforts of politicians of Puritanical attributes, but to Englishmen of sound instincts and love of life, such as Lord Avebury—then Sir John Lubbock—who was primarily responsible for the Early Closing Movement and for the Bank Holiday by which thousands of English youths and girls are given a fleeting chance once a week and once a year respectively of enjoying the vigour of outdoor life. Few accept the vigour and the life, perhaps! But that is in part the evolutionary consequence of a long cycle of Puritanical hatred of life and its tyrannical suppression of it.

The tendencies of the Present should always be watched by a knowledge of the Past. Without an adequate knowledge of History and Biology, it is

not always easy to appreciate the full significance of current events. It is interesting to recall that the distrust and hatred of life manifested by Puritans in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries commenced by interference with the alcoholic beverage of the people, and culminated, but did not end, in "John Lewis and Sarah Chapman, a pair of lovers, being brought for trial on the accusation of sitting together on the Lord's Day under an apple tree in Goodman Chapman's orchard," and of "Captain Kemble being set for two hours in the public stocks for his lewd and unseemly behaviour, that is to say, for kissing his wife 'publicly' upon the threshold of his house, after having been absent from her on a journey for many years"!

There are not wanting many signs in the life of England to-day and in some of the tendencies manifested by recent legislation, that this same Puritanical hatred of life and distrust of its vigour, is extending in the direction along which history in some of its phases may repeat itself. Englishmen should watch, lest some day they find the liberty of life denied them by alien influence and machination. It has been so before, as Captain Kemble and John Lewis and Sarah Chapman shew: it may be so again, if by our supineness we deserve it.

The most interesting part of Mr. Ludovici's book is his restatement of the case of Charles I. Mr. Ludovici, who has examined original documents in the British Museum, says that the whole events of that period have been falsely stated by the Puritans. And, as the school histories have copied the Puritans' presentation of the events of that period, it follows that the account usually presented to us as school children is equally erroneous.

Mr. Ludovici asserts that not Charles and Strafford, but the Long Parliament and the Puritans as a body were the felons. Charles I. fought for "the cause of flourishing life against the growing, but already powerful forces of modern trade, and of mere quantity as distinct from quality." He himself, the whole of his government, and his lieutenants were inspired by the watchword "Respect the Burden." His downfall "can be ascribed to the fact, that he upheld the oppressed against the oppressors and tried to arrest that vile greed of gain and accumulation, at the mercy of which the lower classes were to be left evermore." He had to contend "with mercenary, vulgar and heartless tradespeople or with avaricious and unscrupulous men of power, both of whom raised the specious cry of liberty to conceal their true and more material motives." It is impossible in a Review to do justice to this part of Mr. Ludovici's book; that can only be done by reading the book itself.

Another chapter of great interest and importance is entitled: "*The Decline of Manners and*

Morals." In this chapter the author laments the "gradual passing of the gentleman." He describes the broader and deeper factors which, in his estimation, are the cause of this. There is great wisdom manifested in this chapter and much sound statesmanship. A few extracts will serve to show its value as reminding Englishmen of the nature of the ultimate factors upon which her greatness and her prestige have rested in the Past. "All the world over, where flourishing and powerful societies have been formed and maintained, the notion of the gentleman has appeared in some form or other as a national ideal." There was the gentleman of China, of ancient Egypt, of Athens, of Rome and England." The very existence of a large administration, or of a large nation of citizens, is impossible without such men. And all societies which have started out with the idea of lasting, growing and standing upright, have always instinctively developed the high ideal of the gentleman—the man who can be trusted at all times and all places, the man who is sincere, the man who is staunch and constant in matters of principle, the man who never sacrifices the greater to the less, and the man who is sufficiently self-reliant to be able to consider others." "If England has shown any stability at all, it is owing to the fact that as a nation she has reared crop after crop of such men, and that these men have been sent to all corners of the globe, from Barhein in the Persian Gulf, to Kingston in the island of Jamaica, to represent her and to teach the gentleman's idea of decent living to the world." And, now, I cite a paragraph which is of the utmost significance in its application to the England of to-day. "Once this class begins to decline, England will be in sore straits; for even examples of flourishing life, when they appear, must find **worthy and trusty servants** to fill high places, otherwise the best supreme administration would be helpless." These sentences constitute a light of counsel which directed on to such incidents as are recalled by the words or phrases:—"Marconi"; "A Christmas Visit to the Clyde"; the "resignation of Sir John Simon"; and the Cabinet Minister who practised disloyalty to the Cabinet of which he was a member, more briefly known as the "Mr. Percy Alden affair," should make Englishmen inquire whether the last of our gentlemen—in the sense defined above—have already gone from the public life of England.

Many great empires have existed in the world, of which not as much as a shadow remains to-day. Thousands of years ago they rose and grew and flourished and then decayed, and nothing remains of them but the unseen things that made them great. One of those empires was Ancient Egypt. In fact, it was the first country to be civilised, and deserves the title of *The Birthplace of Civilisation*. Its history is the oldest known, and goes back for over ten thousand years. Such age reminds us at every turn that a great and wonderful past lies behind these years. The country lies in the North-east corner of Africa, with its famous River Nile running through its middle and the greatest desert (the Sahara) in its West. There are stupendous works, which that past has left, scattered over the face of the country, so vast are the buildings and ruins still standing on the banks of the Nile and the edge of the desert, reflecting to us the glory and splendour of the Pharaohs, who left such deeply interesting remains of their greatness, that we cannot help feeling the true glory of Egypt lies in distant time. To trace a history such as this is as difficult as taking in details of a far-spreading view from a mountain-top. The remains of that history rouse the curiosity of every historian. Every building has its own peculiarity and mystery. These buildings were all intact, and tourists went from Greece and Rome to appreciate and admire them in the last three thousand years.

In 640, the *Khalif of Islam* (Amre) conquered Egypt, and on his next day in the country he opened the great Pyramids. On the opposite side of the Nile he built the mosque named after him, and it was the first mosque to be built in Egypt.

Until a century ago no one could guess what the Egyptian writing meant. Then an engraved stone was discovered at Rosetta (now carefully preserved under glass at the British Museum), which has served as a sort of key to unlock the mystery.

On this stone is a certain decree about keeping a king's birthday, and the same decree is given in three different kinds of writing. The lowest is in Greek (which scholars know well), the top is in hieroglyphs (picture carving), and the middle one is also in Egyptian, but in a more running kind of writing used for every-day purposes by the people.

The old Egyptians used papyrus as the material to write on. This is the inner part of the papyrus reed, that grows in such profusion on the Nile banks, and from which the word "paper" is taken. The Book of the Dead was made of these papers,

and is older than the Pyramids. A copy of this book was kept with the dead in their tombs, chapters of which were supposed to give instructions to the dead how to behave in the underworld.

This book is of the utmost interest; in fact, there is no end to its interest, not only on account of its entrancing illustrations, but also for the teaching about the religion of Egypt, and how men tried to fit themselves in life for a happy hereafter, and how they expected to be judged, and how they believed they would live and work on their way through the underworld.

The British Museum has a fine copy of a large number of its chapters, and by studying it again and again something fresh and interesting is found every time.

Apart from religious books there are many other papyri of great age, including fairy tales, war poems, medical and astronomical books, and also lengthy instructions as to behaviour. Diggings and explorations are being continually carried on in the search for more temples and tombs, and inscriptions and papyri are found to fill up the gaps in our knowledge of Ancient Egypt.

Let us now mount to the top of the Great Pyramid of Giza. It is not an easy climb, due to its height, and the rough blocks of stone, which are used as steps, are many feet high. Arabs in flowing white garments will push and pull the visitor all the way up, till he arrives breathless at the top, a height of over four hundred feet, where he can stand and admire the wonderful view. There below is the full flowing river (the Nile), which rises yearly from its bed and fertilises the green and yellow fields with its water and mud. During all that long history the glorious sun day by day, with its golden dancing beams, has risen from out of the tender-glowing colours of the dawn beyond the eastern desert, and travelled in glory across the busy, fertile Nile valley to its evening setting in a blaze of gold and crimson behind the grim, silent hills of the western desert. This is why the sun, the giver of life, held ever chief place among the imaginable gods of the Old Egyptians. One of the many things which makes Egypt so intensely attractive. This setting of the sun is followed by the bright silvery moon with the deep purple sky ablaze with dazzling stars in the clear air—a view applicable to the most ideal description of Shakespeare—the most wonderful sight in nature, especially on the fourteenth day of the lunar month, when the full moon is at the eastern horizon, while the sun is at the western one at the foot of the Pyramids; between which is Cairo crowned with the Citadel on the top of the southern hills, with its mosques and the well-known tombs of the Caliphs.

Buildings so numerous, grand, and immense exist only as the result of hard and laborious work by thousands of human-beings, all of whom have gone—countless generations of them—not only those whose daily work was in the fields, or keeping the embankments in order, etc., all through the long centuries, but builders and workmen of all descriptions without number.

Coming down the Pyramid, a task more difficult for some of the visitors than mounting, the reader may be reminded of the fact that the great mass is solid, except for the passages and the funeral chambers to which they lead. Few care to penetrate into the heart of a pyramid.

What a scene must have been the building of such a mass, with such a base, the depth of which is believed to be some four hundred feet. This basement is in the form of an amphitheatre, with an area of over thirteen acres, and is composed of stores containing all the precious stones and jewellery. These stores are inaccessible.

The object of such an enormous building was solely for the honour and glory of the reigning king, and to provide a secure resting-place for his body after death. A religious point among many others, which suffered no change, was to preserve the body as long as possible whole and entire. This was done by making mummies of the bodies, the science of which is unknown, bandaging them very carefully, and then putting them in decorated coffins hidden away in great stone vaults, in rock tombs.

The Egyptians started their rules under kings, the beginning of which is unknown. Some historians consider Menes, who turned the course of the Nile, as the first king; but there were earlier kings than he.

Before him there are legends of god kings and heroes, and kings of small states. This is proved by specimens of very old pottery with pictures of boats, soldiers, and kings, which give an idea of life long before Menes.

In dealing with the great number of kings of Egypt one finds them conveniently grouped into thirty or more dynasties or families, and the names are gleaned from different lists of kings on tablets and papyri.

Royal names are distinguished by the fact of being surrounded by oval lines, supposed to be a cord tied in a knot to preserve the name from contact with common ones. This oval is called "cartouche." Before the king's name are some Egyptian signs, like an umbrella and an insect over two half-circles. These mean King of N. and S., applicable to the modern geographical division of Lower and Upper Egypt respectively. The old line of division was almost coincident with the

present division, Cairo being almost at this line. Consequently we hear of the double-crown, which is made up of the red crown of N. Egypt and the white one of S. Egypt. In addition to these double-crowns, each Egyptian king called himself the Son of Ra (or the sun), shown by a goose and the round sun with a dot in the middle.

These signs are easily learned and very interesting to know, and they can easily be picked up from the guide-books of the British Museum.

The reader may notice that every king's name ends with "Ra"; e.g., Ch-f-Ra, Men-kau-Ra, etc., which means the son of the sun in each case by different words.

In the British Museum there exists a cast of the wonderful lifelike portrait of King Khafra (the builder of the Second Pyramid). There he sits on his throne, surrounded by memorials of the officials who superintended the building of the Second Pyramid. The original statue is in Cairo Museum, as has been mentioned in the previous article.

Of Menkaura the British Museum possesses part of his skeleton and fragments of his coffin. The inscriptions say he was just and merciful. This is how his reputation is carried down to historians. The rest of the coffin and mummy were lost (as mentioned in the last article) off the coast of Spain on their way to England. He was the builder of the Third Pyramid. Another event which made him more notorious was that the sixty-fourth chapter of the Book of Dead was compiled in his reign.

We cannot help mentioning the Sphinx again, the oldest colossal sculpture in the world, with a lion's body and a woman's head, carved out of a huge rock, whose mystery has always exercised great fascination upon imaginative minds, with its little temple built in between his great paws. His face seems to look out to the horizon, changeless through thousands of years, except by the wanton mischief done by Napoleon Bonaparte on July 31, 1789, in the battle of the Pyramids.

Again, one of the most striking things in the Egyptian works is that of Sheikh el Balad (the Chief of the Village). This represents a fat farmer whose amusing face with the stick in his hand (the custom of Sheikhs) makes everyone smile, and that his sharp eyes would soon find out any wrongdoing in those he had to oversee. It is one of the oldest statues, and is now in Cairo Museum. The Arabic name was given to him when the statue was raised from its bed of sand and dust. The watching people called out in amazement: "It is the Chief of the Village," in correlation with the theoretical history of it in books. The statue keeps the same now.

Two gigantic statues set up in the Plain of Thebes (the ancient Capital of Egypt) go back to 1400 B.C. They are the largest seated figures in the world, and are made of sandstone blocks. One of them has been known as the Singing Memnon, because of the sound given out by the stones when warmed by the morning sun.

Then at Karnak is the wonderful temples of the god Ammon, restored so as to appear in all its ancient glory. It has been described by artists as the noblest effort of architectural magnificence ever produced by the hand of man, and gives some indication of the might and advanced civilisation of Ancient Egypt. An avenue of sphinxes led up to the doorway, and the great Hall contained 134 of these mighty pillars, all brilliantly painted and sculptured. To this Temple went Ammon, with all the state and pomp that it was possible to assume, and as they proceeded up between the impressive avenue of sphinxes (amid the sounds of music), to the portico of the temple, they were regarded with reverence by all the onlookers. Ammon was usually represented as a ram.

Let us now go up the Nile to what is known in modern geography as Upper Egypt. It is the ideal health resort. The visitor travels among many buildings, some of which resemble the numberless gods to whom the Egyptians prayed, and the ruins of which still form one of the sights of Egypt. Finally he reaches the magnificent city and the ancient Capital of Egypt—Thebah, better known as Thebes—once stood, far on the way to Assouan. It stands up to the present with its great halls, imposing gateways, and rows of pillars, and forms a beautiful sight in brilliant sunshine and deep purple shadow, and as we gaze at them we fancy them once more in their first beauty, with long processions of chanting priests and priestesses, and gorgeous display of kingly magnificence, when the king came to pay his worship, amidst the stately monuments of gold and silver, adorned with ivory and precious stones.

And even yet we have not come to the end of our close touch with the past in Egypt, for we can now read the actual message across the years, written in the old Egyptian picture language, which had died out and been completely forgotten after the Roman times in Egypt. A look at the walls and columns of the temples, at the solid vaults, at the coffin cases, at the sculptures, and the wall-paintings, will show most of them covered with this picture-writing.
