GREEN'S MANUAL OF PATHOLOGY AND MORBID ANATOMY. 12th edition, revised and enlarged by W. Cecil Bosanquet and W. W. C. Topley, 1918, London. Price, 18s.

This well-known students' text-book has reached its 12th edition, which is evidence that it continues to fulfil a want, and is able to compete with other books. To compress the subject of pathology and morbid anatomy into 603 pages, parts of which are occupied by 243 diagrams, indicates that no subject can be exhaustively treated. For examination purposes, however, this is not necessary, and for the "ordinary" student, Green's Pathology in its new form is no doubt sufficient. The sections on diseases of the blood and immunity have been largely or completely rewritten, and four successful coloured plates indicate the blood corpuscles in their normal and pathological aspects. So far as we have looked through the book, the information is accurate, and well up-to-date. The illustrations are almost all very well done, and, judged by English standards, the price is not excessive. It seems as if "Green" will continue to survive for a long period yet.

THOMAS ILLINGWORTH & Co.'s X-RAY PHOTOGRAPHIC PAPERS.

The samples of this well-known firm's "Bromide" and "Gaslight" papers which we have received, have proved to be eminently satisfactory, and have given splendid results, even from what at first appeared to be hopeless negatives.

There is a grade of both varieties, for weak and average negatives, and in all cases the results were prints full of gradation and detail, the papers possessing great latitude of exposure and development. The significance of this will undoubtedly appeal to all who know how greatly an X-ray negative of strong contrasts differs

from an ordinary photographic negative of even densities, and their appreciation must certainly extend to Messrs. Illingworth for surmounting a great difficulty of the past.

The fact that satisfactory development can be performed with W.O. plate developer will probably appeal to radiographers in military hospitals, who under present circumstances are unusually busy in this particular branch of photography.

The papers are rapid, enabling quick results to be obtained—often a great consideration.

It is unnecessary here to enter into such details as distance from light, and time of exposure, as full instructions as far as is possible on all these matters is given, and after one or two trials, the ideal conditions can be very easily calculated.

THE "WELCOME" PHOTOGRAPHIC EXPOSURE RECORD AND DIARY FOR 1918.

To all photographers this new edition of so well-known and invaluable a publication cannot fail to appeal, in that the full and perfect instructions given therein, if correctly followed, make the results of the amateur approximate to those of the professional.

The work caters equally well for the novice as for the experienced, and the excellent manner in which the good features have been maintained and perhaps exceeded, in war time, reflects great credit on the publishers, the work in consequence forming a good presentation.

Very clear and fool-proof instructions are given on all photographic subjects, including exposure, developing and fixing, printing and toning, enlarging and focussing, and the numerous tables facilitate all references, once the instructions are understood.

The various "Tabloid" preparations which are fully dealt with must appeal to all photographers who travel, for with the addition of water only, a preparation can be made for all purposes.

The diary and the blank ruled pages for recording photographic memoranda of all kinds must prove an invaluable supplement.

The final feature is a mechanical calculator enabling the correct exposure for all makes of plates and films under all climatic conditions to be determined in an instant.

By a systematic study of the ground, clever selection of aid and relay posts and routes, he evacuated a large number of casualties during the operations. He worked untiringly, regardless of his personal safety, visiting all the advanced aid-posts. His work was invaluable.

Temporary Captain Stanley James Annear Beale.—For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when working in an advanced dressing post. This post was destroyed by a shell which killed the other medical officer and an orderly. Although badly shaken, Captain Beale promptly formed another post and continued to dress the wounded until relieved 24 hours later. It was owing to his untiring energy and splendid devotion to duty that many lives were saved.

Captain Kenneth Biggs.—For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading and organising his stretcher-bearers under intense fire of every description, in such a manner that our wounded were rapidly evacuated. He worked unceasingly in the open for 24 hours, until he was severely wounded. By his admirable courage and determination saving many lives.

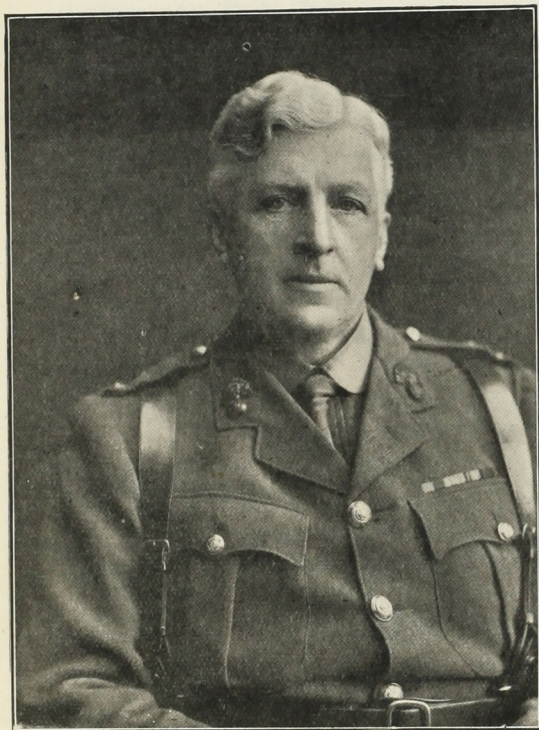

OBITUARY.



COLONEL (ACTING BRIGADIER-GENERAL) ARTHUR ANTHONY HOWELL, C.M.G., T.D., M.R.C.S. Eng., L.R.C.P. Edin.,

who was in command of a London Reserve Brigade, died suddenly on January 15th, at the age of 56. He was the third son of the late Very Rev. David Howell, Dean of St. David's, and received his medical education at the "London," where he entered in October, 1879, qualifying M.R.C.S. Eng. in 1886, and L.R.C.P. Edin. in 1891. After qualification, he held the appointment of House Physician to Drs. Sutton & Turner.

Colonel Anthony Howell had a very distinguished military record.

In 1896 he was granted the commission of Lieutenant in the 3rd Vol. Batt. Royal Fusiliers, and was promoted to a Captaincy in 1899; in 1900 he was appointed Captain in the City of London Imperial Volunteers and served in the South African War, receiving the Queen's Medal with four bars—Johannesburg, Diamond Hill, Orange River Colony, and Cape Colony; in 1901 he returned to his old Volunteer Battalion of the Royal Fusiliers, in which he was promoted to the rank of Major in 1903; in March, 1910, he was appointed Lieut.-Colonel commanding 3rd City of London Battalion of the London

Regiment (Royal Fusiliers); in October, 1916, he was promoted to the rank of Colonel, and acted as Brigadier-General commanding the 1st London Reserve Brigade.

During the present war he served at Neuve Chapelle (March 10th, 1915), Festubert (May-June 1915), Loos (Sept. 25th, 1915), Givenchy (Oct. 13th, 1915), Gommecourt (July 1st, 1916), and the Somme (Sept., 1916).

He was Commandant of the 45th and 56th Divisional School in France, 1915-16.

Among the honours conferred upon Colonel Howell were the following:—Hon. Captain in the Army, 1900; mentioned in Despatches in 1915 and 1916; admitted to the Order of C.M.G., 1915; received the Territorial Decoration, July, 1916; and admitted to the Russian Order of St. Anne (3rd Class with Swords) in September, 1916.

Prior to the present war he was in practice at Worplesdon Hill, Brookwood. He married in 1895 Charlotte Isabel, daughter of the late Mr. John Firth, of Sheffield.

who lost his life as the result of an accident in London, was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Croft, of Dunedin, New Zealand.

Eric Croft, who was born in 1891, started his

medical studies in New Zealand, and entered the London Hospital in May, 1914. Since the war the Hospital has seen very little of him. In August, 1914, he went to Brussels with a Red Cross Party as a dresser. Returning to England in October, he went out again under the Red Cross to France, where he remained till the beginning of January, 1915. He then turned his attention to medicine again, and passed the Second Conjoint in April, 1915. In May he went to Serbia with a Red Cross party. Finding there was nothing to do there, he returned to London in September, 1915. He then decided to join the Army, and was gazetted Second Lieutenant in the R.F.A., September, 1915. In November of the same year he left for France, and was posted to the 7th Division. He remained with the 7th till November, 1917, when he was gassed and sent to England. He was in hospital about a month. At the time of his death he was doing a month's home service, and was stationed at Woolwich. He was very proud of his Division, and was hoping to rejoin them when passed for general service.

Croft had a charming personality, and though his friends at the Hospital were not numerous, as he was not actually there very long, those that knew him knew him as a sterling good fellow. His great anxiety right from the commencement of the war was to be allowed to take an active part in the war in whatever position was most suitable, and though he might well have stayed on at the Hospital after passing "his Second," he could not rest, but felt that he must join the Army. His short career in the Army was crowned with success. He rose from the rank of 2nd Lieut. to Captain in the R.F.A. in the space of two years, and also gained the M.C. for a very plucky piece of work, and I have no doubt he would have won further honour and distinction had he been spared, but his tragic death on the eve of his wedding cut short a career that was so full of promise and utility. A sudden attack of vertigo and consequent fall over a banister caused his death, and the news came as a great blow to all who knew him. He was buried in the R.A. Cemetery at Woolwich in the part set aside for officers who have lost their lives during the war, and his relations will have the solace of knowing that he is at rest with many other brave men who, like him, have given their lives so unselfishly to the great cause for which this country is fighting.

2ND LIEUT. JOHN CHUTE ELLIS, R.F.A., who died of wounds in a dressing station near Poperinghe on June 6th., 1917, entered the "London" from New Zealand in May, 1908,

and qualified L.R.C.P. Lond., M.R.C.S. Eng., in 1911, after which he relinquished his professional work and undertook farming in New South Wales. Shortly after the outbreak of war, he "squared up his sheep station," came to England in the autumn of 1915, was granted a commission in the Royal Horse Artillery, and was posted to St. John's Wood for training. He left England for France in February, 1916, being posted to "Chestnut" or "A" Battery of the R.H.A. He served with them till March, 1917, when he became sick, and was sent to England as Instructor at St. John's Wood Barracks. The life of home service

being uncongenial, he applied for service overseas, and was then posted to a Divisional Ammunition Column. The work of this Column was a little too much in the rear for him, so he applied for a Battery appointment, and was finally posted to one of the Division Batteries. A student contemporary writes that he was informed by the C.O. of the Battery to which Ellis was attached, that while under very heavy shell fire Ellis was strolling about smoking a cigarette encouraging his men, when he was wounded in the head by a shell, the Commanding Officer adding that "his devotion to duty cost him his life."

Another student contemporary writes:—
 "I had the good fortune to be associated with 'Jock' as a student for several years, firstly at the University in Otago, New Zealand, and then for a couple of years at the London Hospital, and the remembrance of those years, with Ellis as my friend, will always remain with me. During the time he was at the 'London,' he made innumerable friends, and those who knew him intimately will always remember his sunny smile and unflinching good nature. I think the expression 'a white man' sums him up. He was a good, all-round athlete, and represented the hospital at cricket in the Inter-Cup matches. His loss will be keenly felt by all his friends, and he has left a gap which will be very difficult to fill for those who knew him."

LIEUT. BENJAMIN WYNFORD PHILIPPS, R.F.C., was born on June 17th, 1893, and was the second son of the Rev. D. Philipps of Newport, Salop. He received his general education at Caterham Congregational College and Newport Grammar School and entered the "London" in October, 1912, from the Medical Missionary Association with the view of ultimately qualifying as a Medical Missionary. In November, 1915, Wynford Philipps joined the Royal Flying Corps and was invalided home early in 1917. Prior to his death he was an Instructor in the Corps and met his end on November 14th, 1917, through an accident while flying in Yorkshire. He was considered an expert pilot and has been referred to in praiseworthy terms by his Commanding Officer.

Wynford Philipps was an all-round athlete and took an active part in the Students' Clubs' Union. Those by whom he was intimately known are serving in H.M. Forces and will read with regret of the untimely end of one with whom they had spent many happy days.

SURGEON KENELM MITCHELL DYOTT, R.N.,
 B.A. Oxon., L.M.S.S.A.,

who lost his life at sea on December 13th, 1917, was born on April 24th, 1888, and was the youngest son of the late Mr. George Dyott, and grandson of the late Lieut.-General Dyott, R.E., of Freeford Hall, Lichfield.

He received his general education at Bedford Grammar School and at the University of Oxford, where he completed the first two years of his medical course, proceeding to the "London" in October, 1913.

At the outbreak of the war he joined the University Public Schools Corps as a private soldier, but in December of the same year

on the advice of the War Office he returned to complete his medical course. He passed in two sections of the final examination of the University for a medical degree, but postponed taking the remaining portions of the examination until after the war, and obtained the qualifying diploma of L.M.S.S.A. granted by the Society of Apothecaries in July, 1915.

After qualification, he obtained a commission in the Royal Naval Medical Service, and was stationed at Haslar Hospital. Before the close of the year he was appointed Assistant-Surgeon on *H.M.S. Tiger*, and was with his ship throughout the Battle of Jutland. In January, 1917,

he received the appointment of P.M.O. on the ship which was torpedoed near the coast. We are informed that Surgeon Dyott was last seen by a surviving officer allotting life-belts to the men.

Surgeon Dyott was a keen athlete, and was a member of the Hospital Clubs' Union Football Team. He married a daughter of Mr. Howard Paget, of Tamworth, in January, 1917.

DR. HAROLD LYNCH BURGESS,

of the West African Medical Service, who was recently lost at sea, entered the "London" in October, 1896, where he gained a prize in Minor Surgery during the following year. He qualified M.R.C.S.Eng., L.R.C.P., Lond., in 1903, and obtained the certificate of the London School of

Tropical Medicine in 1905. After qualification, he held the appointments of House Surgeon and Casualty Officer at the North-East London Hospital for Children, and joined the West

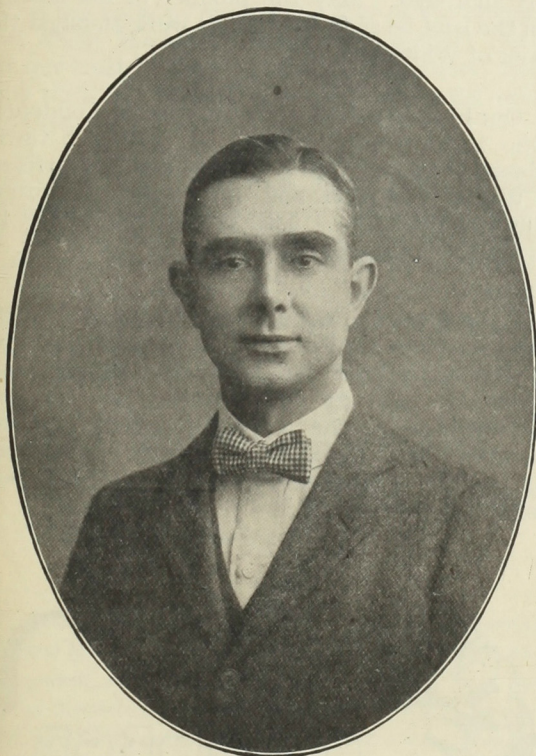
sity of Edinburgh, and afterwards went to Africa as Medical Officer, North-East Rhodesia.

Owing to impaired health, he returned home, and went into practice at Frizington, Cumberland, which he gave up at the outbreak of war, and applied for a commission in the Royal Army Medical Corps, but was rejected because of his ill-health. He then offered his voluntary help to this Hospital, and was gladly received by his brother, Mr. E. W. Morris, the House Governor.

Just over a year ago he was granted a commission in the R.A.M.C., and was put in charge of the Officers' Section at the "London" which he performed with the greatest success.

Sydney Morris was a singularly amiable and unselfish man, whose simplicity, straightforwardness, and generosity won him the affectionate friendship of all who worked with him. In spite of steadily failing health, he persistently devoted himself to his duties, and was always ready to help and advise in a most cheery manner.

He loved the country, especially Surrey, and according to his wish he was laid to rest at

African Medical Service in 1906. In 1913 he was seconded for special service at the Colonial Office, where he remained until November, 1915, during which period he served as Medical Secretary for Tropical Africa, and to the West Africa Yellow Fever Commission. He then returned to Nigeria, joined the Cameroons Expedition, and was gazetted Temporary Captain in the Army (General List), December, 1915, which he retained until March 31st, 1916.

Captain H. L. Burgess returned home on leave on July 7th, 1917. The boat in which he sailed was torpedoed on the journey, and the passengers were rescued by an American destroyer. He sailed from Liverpool for Lagos on October 31st, 1917, on the s.s. *Umgeni*, which was lost at sea.

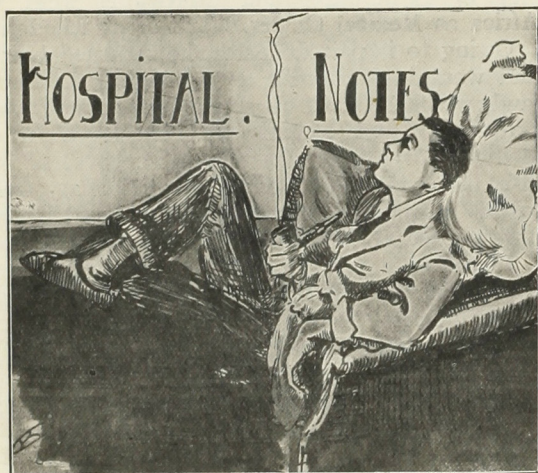
SYDNEY HERBERT MORRIS, M.B., Ch.B. (Edin.),

Colonel Muecke is steadily recovering from his fracture, and we hope it will not be long before he returns to active duties in the Aural Department.

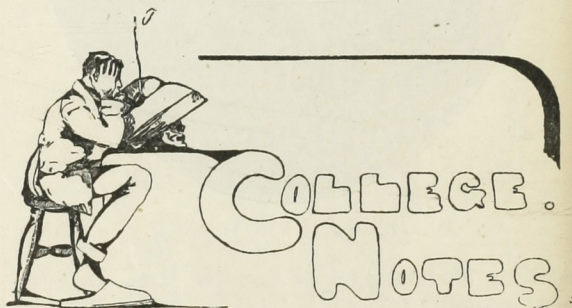

THE LONDON HOSPITAL MEDICAL CLUB

The Medical Agency for Appointments

The Medical Agency was started in 1907 by the London Hospital Medical Club, for the benefit of "Londoners" past and present, and since then a large number of men have availed themselves of its services. The Agency is superintended by the Registrars, with the advice of a Sub-Committee of the Club.

At a Meeting of the Council of the Club on March 15th, 1910, it was decided that certain fees should be charged. A list of these can be obtained from the Registrars. For appointments as *locum tenens* they are as follows:—

(a) If for a longer period than a week—

Members of the Club, 2½ per cent. on amount earned, with a minimum fee of 5/-.

Non-members, 5 per cent., minimum fee 7/6.

(b) If for one week or less—

A fee of 5/- to be paid by the Principal.

For appointments of less than one week no fee is charged to the *locum tenens*.

For appointments of more than one week no fee is charged to the Principal.

The proceeds of the Agency, after the deduction of expenses, will be paid to the London Hospital Medical Club to be used for benevolent purposes.

The new regulations came into force on July 1st, 1910.

- (b) Anyone seeking an appointment as *locum tenens* or otherwise, should add his name to the list kept in the Registrars' Office. Information will be sent by post or telegraph, as soon as a suitable position is heard of.

Men who are entering their names for the first time must do so personally to the Registrar in charge of the Agency.

- (c) Particulars of practices, partnerships, Hospital appointments, etc., can be obtained from the Registrar in charge of the Agency, who can be seen daily at 12 o'clock in the Registrars' Office.
