

be seen accurately reproduced in the famous play "Bella Donna," at St. James's Theatre.

Bricks, such as the Israelites made for use in building stone cities for their hard taskmasters, necklaces and jewellery, such as they may have taken when they "spoiled the Egyptians," are here in the British Museum before our eyes.

As we again think over the romantic story of Moses rescued by the King's daughter, and brought up in the palace itself, we find endless objects with which to frame his life from childhood onwards.

The toys and games, especially the animals—such as a modern-looking spotted cow, and a cat with a movable jaw—must have pleased him, and a garden with trees and a pond, like one that is pictured on a wall, would be delightful for a child to play in. Moses may well have heard music from instruments such as those pipes and harps, and he must have enjoyed sailing and rowing on the Nile.

The wall-paintings from the tombs show in their bright colours how the Egyptians amused themselves in the time of Moses, and before and after.

There are the gay parties with music and dancing; a father shooting birds with a sort of boomerang, the child holding on to his leg for fear of falling out of the boat; the mother gathering lotus flowers; the family cat retrieving the birds three at a time.

The Ten Commandments, brought down from Sinai by Moses after he had left Egypt, are all shadowed in the forty-two commandments of the Book of the Dead. The making and worship of the Golden Calf, which so angered the great leader, was suggested by the ancient worship of Egypt, and is brought to our knowledge in endless forms by paintings and images of every description, as well as by the mummied forms of the animals held in such sacred reverence.

THE LONDON HOSPITAL CLUBS' UNION

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The last statement upon the financial position of the Clubs' Union was for the year ending March 31st, 1914, which appeared in our columns in June, 1914. We are therefore publishing with this statement the Income and Expenditure Accounts, and Balance Sheets, for the years 1914/15 and 1915/16. Hitherto the accounts of the Clubs' Union have been arranged in a statement shewing the receipts and payments for the year in question, but, upon the advice of the Auditors, they are now arranged in the form of an Income and Expenditure Account, with a Balance Sheet: the former shewing the sums receivable and payable for the financial year as well as the sums which have been received and paid, and from the latter can be gathered the financial position of the Clubs' Union at the close of the financial year.

The funds of the Union have been seriously affected by the loss of subscriptions during the years under consideration in consequence of the

large number of students suspending their studies to engage in War service. Under these circumstances it was considered inadvisable to deal with outstanding subscriptions as recoverable, but a marginal note has been made in the accounts of both years.

Prior to the War, a portion of the profits on the catering for the Dining Hall was a source of Income to the Clubs' Union. During the year 1914/15 we regret to report that the Dining Hall suffered a loss of £119, and it is feared that there will also be a loss on the present year's trading, notwithstanding the fact that prices in the tariff have been increased where possible. A saving has been affected by substituting waitresses for waiters who are serving in the War, and other measures of economy have been introduced, but against this has to be placed a decrease in the sales of approximately 38%. It will, therefore, be understood how seriously the Clubs' Union funds are affected by this loss when it is pointed out that the Finance Committee depended upon an annual income of at least £200 of the profits on the catering to meet the increased expenditure of £150 for interest on the additional loan of £3,767 4s. 5d., advanced by the House-Committee. This sum was required for the extension of the athletic ground.

It will be seen that members of the honorary staff have kindly contributed their subscriptions as heretofore.

A new item in the income of the past year is a grant of £150 from the *Gazette*. The accounts of the *Gazette* are also published with this statement. We should like to take this opportunity of informing our readers that it is impossible to publish the *Gazette* as frequently as during peace time, but that every endeavour is made to compensate them by publishing fuller numbers, and also by inserting articles which we believe prove interesting to all. Our readers will be pleased to hear that complimentary copies of the *Gazette* are despatched to past and present students now serving with H.M. Forces.

The expenditure of the Clubs' Union is being curtailed as far as possible. The athletic ground has to be maintained in order, but the item for the cost of this will show a reduction in next year's account as the turf on a portion of the ground is being kept low by sheep grazing thereon, the farmer to whom the sheep belong paying a sum of £5 for the privilege during the summer months. It is anticipated that this measure will affect a saving of at least £50. Students are using the other portion of the ground for cricket, tennis and football, although, of course, not to the same extent as they were prior to the War. The grant to the Athenæum has to be continued in order to maintain the supply of newspapers, magazines, etc.,

as well as stationery, but these have been reduced where it has been found possible to do so.

The only items in the balance sheet upon which we think an explanation is necessary are the loans advanced by the House-Committee. It is considered that the House-Committee have no security in Loan No. 3 (£1,600) in as much as this sum was not required for the purchase of the additional five acres but for levelling, draining and turfing the same, and the amount has therefore to be dealt with as a liability to be repaid to the House-Committee as our funds permit.

Before concluding this statement we should like to impress members with the fact that the whole of the work in connection with the levelling, draining and turfing the ground extension was carried out by the Groundsman with a staff of workmen, the Surveyor of the Hospital kindly giving his services in supervising the work. By this means the work was carried out at the lowest figure possible, as we escaped expenses which would have been necessarily incurred by a contractor. Furthermore, the work was begun in June, 1914, before the cost of labour had risen, and was completed by the following spring. The Athletic Ground, now over 13 acres in extent, is in good condition, and we therefore look forward to the time, which we trust is not far distant, when students will be able to take full advantage of their opportunities for games, inasmuch as it provides accommodation for both Rugby and Association Football, as well as for Hockey, Cricket and Tennis. It is pleasing to know that our Hockey Club in future will not have to search elsewhere for ground as hitherto, and for which the Clubs' Union funds had to meet an annual outlay of £30: and further, that we are now in a position to offer a second Rugby Football ground to our members.

In conclusion, we should like to state that we shall be pleased to enter more fully into details with any member who may wish for further information.

THE LONDON HOSPITAL MEDICAL CLUB

The Medical Agency for Appointments

The Medical Agency was started in 1907 by the London Hospital Medical Club, for the benefit of "Londoners" past and present, and since then a large number of men have availed themselves of its services. The Agency is superintended by the Registrars, with the advice of a Sub-Committee of the Club.

At a Meeting of the Council of the Club on March 15th, 1910, it was decided that certain fees should be charged. A list of these can be obtained from the Registrars. For appointments as *locum tenens* they are as follows:—

- (a) If for a longer period than a week—
Members of the Club, 2½ per cent. on amount earned, with a minimum fee of 5/-.
Non-members, 5 per cent., minimum fee 7/6.
- (b) If for one week or less—
A fee of 5/- to be paid by the Principal.
For appointments of less than one week no fee is charged to the *locum tenens*.
For appointments of more than one week no fee is charged to the Principal.

The proceeds of the Agency, after the deduction of expenses, will be paid to the London Hospital Medical Club to be used for benevolent purposes.

The new regulations came into force on July 1st, 1910.

- (a) Any Practitioner requiring a *locum tenens*, etc., is requested to send full particulars to:—

- (b) Anyone seeking an appointment as *locum tenens* or otherwise, should add his name to the list kept in the Registrars' Office. Information will be sent by post or telegraph, as soon as a suitable position is heard of.

Men who are entering their names for the first time must do so personally to the Registrar in charge of the Agency.

- (c) Particulars of practices, partnerships, Hospital appointments, etc., can be obtained from the Registrar in charge of the Agency, who can be seen daily at 12 o'clock in the Registrars' Office.

His Majesty's Forces now include millions of men of every grade of life and degree of education. Many of these are young men who have had to break off their studies when they rallied to the National Service, and who are rightly desirous of continuing their reading during periods of enforced inactivity. An appeal is now made for funds and books to enable the Council to undertake and carry out this work. Donations, and offers of books, may be made to the Secretary of the Council at the above address.

NOTICE TO OFFICERS AND MEN OF HIS MAJESTY'S FORCES AT HOME OR ABROAD

The Council will be glad to hear from officers and others as to any suitable books of an educational character which are required by them or by the men serving in their units. It is also proposed to provide in the Huts of the Y.M.C.A., and in the various Hospitals (through the Red Cross and St. John Ambulance War Library), collections of books similarly selected. The Council will endeavour to procure these books, and also any others affording more solid reading.
