We are able to give the following details of some of the Honours which have been recently conferred :—

*Bar to the M.C.*

Temporary Captain George D'Rastrik Carr, R.A.M.C. Although himself wounded, he continued to tend and dress the wounded, displaying great courage and determination throughout.

*Military Cross*

Second Lieutenant Charles Cecil Rowland, R.A., Special Reserve. He went forward under intense fire, and obtained most valuable information. Later he rendered valuable service by establishing lamp communication. On another occasion, at great personal risk, he gallantly extinguished a fire in an ammunition dump.

Second Lieutenant J. P. Traylen, Machine Gun Corps. For gallantry in action and devotion to duty. When the Germans made a strong counter attack, he at once gathered together a party of five men and occupied a shell hole above his dug-out, keeping the enemy from advancing up the trench. After several minutes he was forced to retire, but receiving a supply of bombs, he advanced up the trench again, bombing the enemy back and driving him into shell holes. When the supply ran out he went back for reinforcements and advanced again up the trench. The enemy being also harrassed on the other flank, surrendered. He then very gallantly went out towards the German lines and brought in two of our men, whom he saw lying there, and who had been hit in the legs. During this gallant act he was sniped at continuously.

Temporary Captain Thomas Bourne-Price, R.A.M.C. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during operations. He went from place to place under very heavy shell-fire to try and get into communication with the ambulance cars. Finally, he was half smothered by the explosion of three successive heavy shells. For many months he has done very fine and gallant work when in charge of stretcher-bearers, and when tending and evacuating wounded under shell-fire.

Captain Harold Gordon Oliver, R.A.M.C. He organized and led stretcher parties under very heavy fire with great courage and determination.

Captain Hugh Huntley Robinson, R.A.M.C. He attended the wounded with great courage and skill, quite regardless of personal danger. He has on many previous occasions displayed the greatest bravery.

Captain F. Sanders, M.B., R.A.M.C., Special Reserve. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in action. For forty-eight consecutive hours he worked in "No Man's Land," tending and carrying in the wounded, although he was wounded at the time.

Temporary Captain Wilfred Archer Sneath, M.B., F.R.C.S., R.A.M.C. He was out every night tending the wounded under fire. On one occasion he went out two hundred yards in advance of our front line, and dressed a wounded man under machine-gun fire, afterwards bringing him in.

Temporary Captain J. M. Stenhouse, M.B., R.A.M.C. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during several days of operations, when attending to the wounded under heavy shell-fire. He repeatedly exposed himself when dressing wounds, and finally was wounded.

Temporary Lieutenant James Arthur Liley, R.A.M.C. He attended the wounded in the open, and in the front trenches, under very heavy shell-fire. His coolness under heavy fire had a great moral effect on the men.

Temporary Lieutenant James Ernest Studholme Wilson, R.A.M.C. He went up to the front line from his aid post through a very heavy barrage, in order to assist the wounded. By his pluck and skill he undoubtedly saved many lives.

Temporary Captain Cecil Stedman Cloake, Royal Berkshire Regiment. He went forward under heavy shell-fire, reorganized two companies which had lost their officers, and by his cool pluck restored confidence among the men at a critical time.

Temporary Captain Cyril Carlyle Beatty, R.A.M.C. For conspicuous courage and coolness when in charge of an advanced dressing station. By his fine work he has ensured quick and successful evacuation of wounded from the aid posts. In times of difficulty he set an invaluable example.

Second Lieutenant Eric Croft, R.F.A., Special Reserve. For conspicuous gallantry when proceeding under orders to gain information as to the position of our front line. He encountered a hostile party, consisting of an officer and 35 men, who showed fight, but with an Infantry Officer and two bombers only, he forced the whole party to surrender.

Temporary Captain Thomas Bourne-Price, R.A.M.C. He went from place to place under very heavy shell fire to try and get into communication with the ambulance cars. Finally he was half smothered by the explosion of three successive heavy shells. For many months he has done very fine and gallant work when in charge of stretcher-bearers, and when tending and evacuating wounded under shell fire.

Temporary Captain Nicol McNicoll Rankin, M.B., R.A.M.C. For remaining at his post and attending to wounded after the regimental aid post had received three direct hits and he himself had been wounded in the face. For four hours he continued at duty, the area around his aid post being heavily shelled all the time.

## OBITUARY

## Surgeon G. A. WALKER

was killed in action on November 14th. He was 28 years of age, and was the second son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Henry Walker, of Highgarth, Mirfield, and Rhosneigr. Volunteering for service in August, 1914, Surgeon Walker was at Cromarty for 12 months, and then became attached to the R.N.D., and went out to Gallipoli, being one of the last to leave Helles.

After, he had a hospital at Tenedos for a time, and then went to another theatre of War, and he had not had a leave for 14 months. He was educated at Epsom College, and entered the Medical College in October, 1906, qualifying M.R.C.S. (Eng.), L.R.C.P. (Lon.) in 1912. His brother Gerald (Second-Lieutenant, K.O.Y.L.I.) was also killed in action on July 1st, and his youngest brother is a prisoner at Ruhleben.

## Captain W. J. MACCOMBIE,

aged 24, who was killed on July 17th, was the only surviving son of Dr. and Mrs. John MacCombie, Manor House, Rothwell, Northants. He was

educated at Oundle School and Caius College, Cambridge. Having taken his B.A. and passed the second M.B. examination, he entered the "London" to complete his medical studies.

His keenness to get out to France was such that he gave up his medical studies, fearing that the War would be over before he could qualify. In October, 1914, he obtained a commission in the King's Own Scottish Borderers, and joined one of this Regiment's Service Battalions in France a year later. His zeal and good leadership soon obtained for him the command of a Company, with the rank of Captain. For the following nine months he increasingly endeared himself to his men, being fearless in the leadership of wiring parties, and other incidents of trench warfare. Last July came the still greater events of the Somme battle, and during the first week the way in which he kept his Company together in a wood (then an advanced outpost, and heavily shelled for six days and nights) increased the admiration which the whole Battalion had for him.

A few days later he again distinguished himself in the advance through a village, now captured, till on July 17th, to the regret of all, he was fatally wounded by an enemy sniper. "We have lost our best friend," was the cry of the men of his Company.

At Cambridge he only just failed to obtain his Rugger blue.

## Second-Lieutenant R. DOUGLAS FRENCH,

who was killed, on September 15th, was the eldest son of Dr. and Mrs. French, of Moss Bank, North Finchley, and was 18 years of age. He was educated at Epsom College, and began his Medical studies in the College, in April, 1915. He was a member of the O.T.C., and in October, 1915, got his commission in the London Regiment, and went out to the Front last May. His Colonel writes:—"I can assure you of my great regret, for your son was a promising young soldier, and the battalion could ill spare him. And he fell in a most gallant assault in the German lines." The O.C. of his company wrote:—"He died bravely leading his men, by whom he was much admired, which was shown by the fact that two men went through grave risks, and even lost their lives in trying to save him. He was indeed a brave fellow, and we shall all miss him. . . . His men write of him—he was a true English gentleman, a great lover of England and duty, always thinking of others' happiness, and to be anywhere near him was to know real happiness—a baby in years, but a man in heart and purpose. And he died a 'real little hero.'" Through the good work of the Red Cross, Dr. French has been able to interview some

of the men who were present on the day of the battle, and who are now wounded and in hospital, and they told him that Lieutenant French was wounded, but as he was the only officer of the company left to "carry on" he had his wounds dressed, and said, "Boys, you have all mothers, and we must think of the women and children of England, and go on and win. So come on, boys, let's turn them out." While objective was being taken Lieutenant French was shot dead by machine-gun fire.

## Second-Lieutenant W. G. FLETCHER,

third son of Mr. R. Fletcher, of 19, Wadham Gardens, London, N.W., killed in action on July 3rd, aged 22. He was educated at Highgate School and in France, and entered the Medical College in October, 1913. He joined the Australian Voluntary Hospital, and went to the Front with

that unit. Later, he came home, got a commission in the North Staffords on January 28th, 1915, and went to the Front with the South Lancashire Regiment. He was wounded last January, and returned to the Front in April.

## Second-Lieutenant A. J. HARRIS

was at school at Chigwell, and was a Sergeant in the Cadet Corps there. He came to the "London" in October, 1914, and was one of the most popular men of his year with both tutors and fellow-students. He was quiet and unassuming, but was nevertheless a keen student, taking little or nothing for granted. He joined the O.T.C. in October, 1914, and during the year attended both the Whitsun and Summer Camps. He obtained a commission in the 3rd Battalion (King's Own) Royal Lancaster Regiment in December, 1915, and, a little later, joined his Battalion at Plymouth.

We sympathise deeply with his parents, because although only known to us for so short a period, "Bert" was loved by us all.

Lieutenant H. S. JACKSON,

aged 20, who was killed on July 1st, was the son of the Rev. Sydney Jackson, of White Heather, Mitcham, Surrey. He was educated at St. John's School, Leatherhead, and Whitgift Grammar School, and entered the Medical College in October, 1913.

Lieutenant Jackson was killed in the attack across "No Man's Land." He was badly wounded in the neck, and fell into a shell hole, close to the neighbourhood of La Boisselle Church.

Before joining as a Combatant, Jackson had served for many months in the capacity of a Dresser, first with the Anglo-Belgian Hospital, and later at the Anglo-American Hospital, at Wimereux. He had come under the close observation of several members of our Staff, particularly perhaps, Mr. Lett and Dr. Luker. It was, we believe, the opinion of all who knew him that no one of the many men who have during the last two years worked and fought in France, better upheld the high traditions of the London Hospital, no one in laying down his life made the sacrifice of a more brilliant and honourable career. He has left an indelible memory with many of us.

Second Lieutenant C. W. ODAM

was the younger son of Mr. and Mrs. C. Odam, of Mount Boone, Dartmouth. He was born on July 6th, 1897, and educated at Taunton School, and was a member of the School O.T.C. He entered the Medical College in October, 1914, joining the London University O.T.C., and passed the 1st M.B. Examination, July, 1915. Gazetted to 6th London Regiment, January, 1916, Lieutenant Odam went across to France in May. He was killed in action, in the battle of the Somme, on September 15th—"Whilst very gallantly leading his men."

"We all officers and men, deeply regret his death, and feel proud of what he has done." . . . "I cannot possibly tell you how much I and the other officers miss him now, for he was certainly one of the most popular officers this Battalion has ever had. Although he was so young he made up for it with pluck and grit, and died leading his men." "Not a single officer or man, who is left,

Second-Lieutenant J. L. ROBERTON,

aged 21, killed on September 8th, was the youngest son of Mr. R. H. Robertson, J.P., and Mrs. Robertson, of Stoke Golding Lodge, Leicestershire. He was educated at Magdalen College School, Oxford, and went to South Africa to study farming at the Rhodesian Government experimental farm; he returned to England in 1914, matriculated in the University of London, and entered the Medical College as a Student. In 1915 he joined the O.T.C., and received his commission in the Yorkshire Regiment. After being Machine-gun Instructor for some time, he was transferred to the Royal Flying Corps, and gained his pilot's certificate. While patrolling the lines he crossed to attack a hostile craft, and while doing so, his machine was shot down by a Fokker. Death was supposed to be instantaneous, and due to an explosion of the petrol tank.

Lieutenant-Colonel A. N. WALKER,

who was killed, at the Front, on September 24th, was the second son of the late Dr. George Edward Walker, founder at St. Paul's Eye Hospital, Liverpool. He was educated at Liverpool College and Queen's College, Cambridge, and was a Member of the Final Fellowship Class at the "London" in 1906. After qualifying, in 1898, he was House-Physician to the Liverpool Royal Infirmary, and Assistant Lecturer on Anatomy at the University, before he began to devote himself exclusively to Ophthalmic Surgery, in which his father had been distinguished before him. Besides his Surgeoncy at St. Paul's Hospital, he was Ophthalmic Surgeon to the David Lewis Northern Hospital, and to the School for the Indigent Blind, as well as one of two Ophthalmic Surgeons under the Liverpool Education Committee in connection with the Scheme for the Treatment of School Children. Dr. Walker made numerous contributions to the literature of his subject, among the most important being the record of a novel and successful experiment in the control of ophthalmia neonatorum. Dr. Walker served in the South African War, and later, on joining the Territorial Army, was appointed to the command of a Battery of West Lancashire Artillery. On the
