## OBITUARY

SIR FREDERIC S. EVE, F.R.C.S. ENG.,

Temporary Lieutenant-Colonel, R.A.M.C.; Consulting Surgeon, Eastern Command, and to the London Hospital and Princess Henry of Battenberg's Hospital.

About the time of the last issue of the *Students' Gazette*, London Hospital men heard with regret that Sir Frederic Eve had died in London, after a very short illness.

Nearly five months have passed since then, months crowded with tragic events and sorrow for individuals and the nation, but it would not be fitting to allow the death of one so well known at the London Hospital to pass unnoticed in the *Gazette*. The following is based on an account written for the *Lancet* (December 23rd, 1916), and I am indebted to the courtesy of the Editor for permission to republish it with additions.

Born in 1853, son of the late William Eve, of North Ockenden, Essex, Frederic Samuel Eve entered St. Bartholomew's Hospital as a student about the time (1871) when Sir James Paget retired from active duty, and he followed the same course of pathological work with ardour and success. As curator of the museum at St. Bartholomew's he brought out in 1882 the catalogue of that fine collection. The year before this he became pathological curator in the Royal College of Surgeons of England, being the first to hold this appointment, and he continued to work in the Museum at Lincoln's Inn Fields until 1890. To the College of Surgeons it was important to have as curator a surgeon engaged in active hospital work, one who knew the problems which were specially engaging the surgical world and who would help to supply the Museum with specimens directly relating to them. On the other hand, the unique facilities for observing and working out rare and interesting cases provided by these two pathological appointments were of the utmost value to Frederic Eve. Like Sir James Paget, his early friend and teacher, he was especially attracted to the investigation of tumours, though his best work was by no means

confined to this branch of pathology. On the subject of surgical tuberculosis, diseases of bones and joints, certain fractures and dislocations, and the abdominal viscera, he published original papers which advanced knowledge and will for long be consulted. As Erasmus Wilson lecturer during several years (1882-83-84), he brought forward his work on tumours, especially those of the jaws, in which he established the malignant nature of a form of cystic tumour involving these bones. But his first important paper, read before the Royal Medical and Chirurgical Society in 1880, dealt with the subject of direct dorsal dislocation of the hip. This early paper was typical of all Frederic Eve's work, for it gave in clear, concise language

views resulting from his own research; where they differed from those advanced by others the contrast was strongly asserted. The paper was not only well written, but well illustrated; further, the foundation of the paper was pathological, and this is true of nearly all his very numerous publications up to his recent Bradshaw Lecture on Hæmorrhagic and Chronic Pancreatitis.

With the exception of a course of pathological study at Leipzig, Eve had hitherto (up to 1883) been associated only with St. Bartholomew's Hospital and the College of Surgeons. At the former institution he had established claims for a Staff appointment, when a vacancy should arise, but none seemed then likely to occur for several years.

In those days at each general Hospital there was only one Surgical Registrar, and this post at the "London" became vacant in 1883. There were no strong candidates ready from our School, and hearing of this, Eve took the bold step of severing his connection with St. Bartholomew's, and of migrating to the "London." It was known that a vacancy on our Surgical Staff would shortly occur, and this happened after Eve had served as Registrar for only twelve months. The contest which followed for the post of Assistant-Surgeon was an exceptionally keen one, it sharply divided the Staff, and for a time caused some bitterness of feeling.

Eve owed his election to seniority of years and to his pathological publications.

From this date (1884) during the next thirty years Eve's work was associated almost entirely with the London Hospital, the only other one to which he was attached for a time being the Evelina Hospital for Children. He served for about fourteen years as Assistant-Surgeon to Mr. J. McCarthy, so that promotion in this respect was felt by him to be slow. On the other hand, he had escaped from the Registrar's laborious duties very lightly.

So well known and remembered by a host of London Hospital men must be the work of Sir Frederic Eve that it is unnecessary for me to say much here.

I know that he was a bold and brilliant operator and a most successful teacher in the wards. With the exception of the Lectureship on Surgical Pathology for a few years, he held none of the special teaching posts at the London Hospital, but was for a time Ophthalmic Surgeon until the inevitable separation between ophthalmic and general surgical work came to him as to others. He performed his full share of work on the Medical Council of the Hospital and on the College Board during the arduous years when both Medical College and Hospital were steadily developing against grave financial and other obstacles to their present high position. His powers of clinical investigation and teaching were of the utmost service to the students of the Hospital. But above all his great success in these directions, as well as in private practice, it is as a surgeon-pathologist that Sir Frederic Eve won renown, and by his work in surgical pathology, as indeed he himself would have desired, his memory will be preserved in our profession.

Eve's contributions to surgical literature are numerous. In the Transactions of the Pathological Society will be found no less than 60 papers by him, and it is difficult to select out of so large a number the most valuable ones. Several related to diseases of animals, others to rare forms of tumours, such as those of the great omentum, renal growths containing combined muscle and sarcoma tissue, endotheliomata of the brain, cystic tumours of the testis, congenital hypertrophy (giant growth) of the extremities, sarcoma of the tongue. One paper of particular interest illustrated that very rare disease, psorospermial cysts of the ureteric lining membrane. Another proved that a form of chronic enlargement of lymphatic glands without any caseation was really of tuberculous nature—a valuable and original observation. Besides this mass of pathological work Eve contributed no fewer than 15 papers to the Clinical Society's Transactions, and six to those of the Medical Society and the Royal Society of Medicine. Especial attention may be drawn to those describing enormous cystic dilatation of the common bile-duct (Clin. Soc., 1906), traumatic myositis

ossificans (ibid., 1899), arthrectomy of the knee for tubercle with almost perfect recovery of movements in the joint (ibid., 1901), two cases of mesenteric cyst in children with dissection and illustrations (Med. Chir. Trans., 1898), and angioma of muscles and synovial membrane. Of late years Eve was especially interested in abdominal surgery, and of his papers on this subject we may select one on resection of the large intestine, as it included a review of tuberculous disease of the cæcum simulating appendicitis, a condition which has led most surgeons at one time or other into serious errors of diagnosis and treatment. It is doubtful whether his advocacy of gastro-plication or of operations for fixing up the prolapsed stomach will receive much support, but every paper from Eve's pen bears evidence of his industry, scientific acumen, and wide pathological knowledge.

Some allusion must here be made, however briefly and imperfectly, to Sir Frederic Eve's official work for the Royal College of Surgeons of England. Apart from his long tenure of the Curatorship in the Museum and his Erasmus Wilson and Bradshaw Lectures, he served for nine years on the Examining Board (1902 to 1911). Eve was an ideal surgical examiner, always considerate to the candidates and scrupulously fair. In 1904 he was elected on to the Council, and at the time of his death was one of the Vice-Presidents. Few persons realise the very great amount of time and labour required from the holders of these posts, and Eve left nothing undone during the term of his office. In all, his work at the College covered the long period of 24 years, and he was justly proud of his high position on its Council, which no one could have better earned.

Sir Frederic Eve was knighted in 1911, his death, which occurred on December 15th, came with tragic suddenness, as he was seized with pneumonia only three or four days before the fatal issue. On the outbreak of the war Sir Frederic Eve, with other members of the London Hospital Staff, took up work at the Military Hospital in Chelsea. After serving there for some time and being promoted in rank, he left it to become Consultant to the Military Hospitals in the Eastern Counties. His new duties entailed frequent and long journeys, and it is probable that during one of these he contracted his fatal illness.

His long and successful professional career naturally absorbed his energies and interest, and I do not think much remains to be said from any other point of view. He enjoyed motoring, was a good shot, and at one time took up golf as a recreation, though he had neither time nor the requisite enthusiasm to go far with the latter.

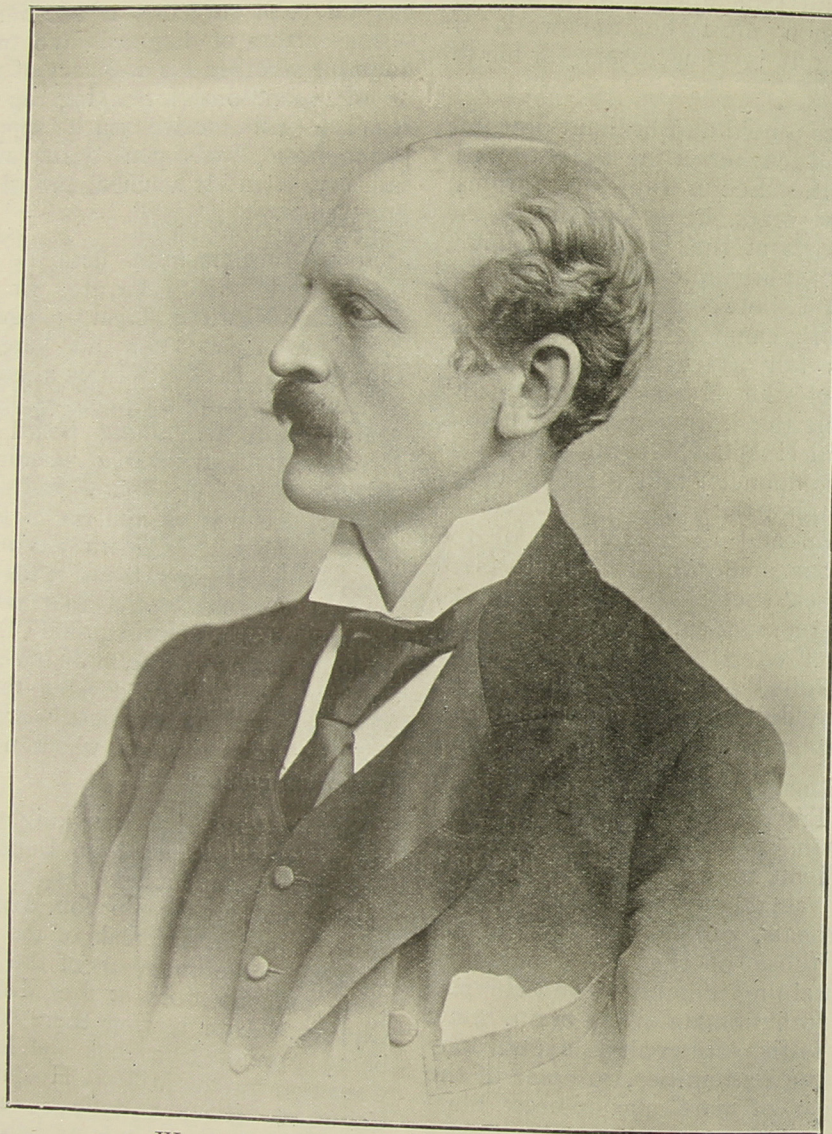


## WILLIAM RAWES, F.R.C.S. ENG., M.D. DURH.

William Rawes entered the "London" in October, 1882, and for some few months we lived together in Oxford Street, where the Lückes' Nursing Home now stands, and hence I knew him well, and a better companion I never wish to have; loyal to a degree, and usually very cheerful, though an occasional fit of the "blues" would sometimes make him a bit crusty, but it never lasted long. He qualified M.R.C.S. Eng. in August, 1885, and took the M.B. Durham with 2nd Class Honours in June, 1886. He obtained the F.R.C.S. Eng. in 1888, and the M.D. Durh. in 1898.

After qualifying in 1885, Rawes was appointed House-Physician to Drs. Hughlings Jackson and Stephen Mackenzie, and later to a House-Surgeoncy under Mr. John Couper.

We were keen rivals in work, but that made no difference in our friendship, and Rawes was the first to advise me to go for the Medical Registrarship, which he might very easily have considered he ought to have had. Rawes drifted too early into official medicalism to develop the very best that was in him, first into the Post Office and then to St. Luke's, though both services gained by his sacrifice. My own impression is that he hated the commercial aspect of Medicine so heartily that he chose an official competency rather than any possibility of having disagreeables about remuneration.

He was too honest to write much, and that only on friendly compulsion, but his silence was not that of ignorance, but of choice; I personally valued his opinion and advice on any mental case more than anything I got from books, for he had a very happy knack of going to the kernel of the matter in very few words, and giving one exactly the clue to the difficulty that needed elucidation.

He was fond of travelling on his holidays, and was a keen fisherman, and, like all of that ilk, his adventures lost nothing in the telling on his return, though many I have heard were rather at his expense.

When the Bank of England bought St. Luke's Hospital in 1916, Rawes worked like a Trojan to clear things up for his Committee, and I verily believe that his grief at leaving his old quarters had an unfavourable influence on his health, for many of us who knew him well had noticed for some months how ill he was looking, and when I heard he was ill with a pneumonia affection, I feared the worst; on removal to a nursing home, however, he gave me hopes of a rally, but his strength was too much undermined, and he died rather suddenly but peacefully from heart failure.

JAMES ELRICK ADLER, F.R.C.S.

## JAMES ELRICK ADLER

was born at Highbury on October 25th, 1881. He was the son of the late Rev. James Alexander Adler, who was for 20 years senior missionary to the Mildmay Mission.

He entered the London Hospital as a student in 1900, and after qualification at the Colleges he obtained the Fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons in 1908. From 1905 to 1908 he worked at the Hospital, being successively Surgical Out-Patient Clinical Assistant, House-Physician to Sir Bertrand Dawson and Dr. O. Leyton, Receiving Room Officer, and finally House-Surgeon to Sir F. Eve and Mr. Furnivall.

For the next few years he devoted himself to bacteriology, and he worked as Research Demonstrator under Dr. Bulloch, and in 1910 worked under Sir A. Wright at St. Mary's Hospital upon vaccine therapy. In 1911 he started private practice in Bryanston Street, and specialized in vaccine therapy. He built and fitted up a bacteriological

laboratory there. When War broke out he became attached as Bacteriologist to the Harold Fink Hospital for Officers, 17, Park Lane, and to Princess Henry of Battenberg's Hospital in Hill Street. In 1915 he obtained a commission as Captain in the R.A.M.C., and was in France for three months. He returned to England at Christmas, 1915, and in June, 1916, was appointed as Bacteriologist to the Bermondsey Military Hospital, where he fitted up a laboratory for bacteriological investigations. Major Tims, with whom he worked, writes:—"He was an enthusiastic worker, and devoted himself more especially to trench nephritis, for which the Hospital offered much material. His loss was greatly felt by all."

Adler was an extremely hard worker, and very enthusiastic in the special branch of bacterial vaccines. He was always ready to help a colleague in a difficulty, and practically wore himself out by his devotion to his private patients and to the Military Hospitals with which he was connected. He was also no mean black and white artist, and illustrated several medical books.

He died of pneumonia, November 27th, 1916, aged 35 years.

## Captain CUTHBERT EDMUND ARNOLD HUDDART, R.A.M.C.,

died suddenly, at the age of 39, on January 29th, whilst on embarkation duty. He was the second son of the late Dr. C. H. C. Huddart, of Etchingham. He entered the "London" in 1896, and obtained the diploma of L.S.A. Lond. in February, 1902. For some years he was in practice at Gloucester Terrace, Hyde Park. His commission as Temporary Lieutenant, R.A.M.C., was dated November 28th, 1915, and he was promoted to Temporary Captain after a year's service. He had served in Malta and Egypt for several months, and was proceeding to France in a few days. He married, in June, 1908, Olga Florence, youngest daughter of Mr. Orlando J. G. B. Bridgeman Simpson, of Wentbridge, Pontefract, by whom, together with a son, he is survived.

## Seaman MAURICE JOSEPH OATLEY,

whose death at the early age of 23 is a loss which has been severely felt by all those whose work lies in the administrative departments of the Hospital and College. At the outbreak of War he joined the London Volunteer Rifles, and from that Regiment passed, in October, 1915, into the Royal
