

capability, kindness, loyalty, tolerance, truthfulness, and hopefulness, and shows how these virtues are attained.

This little book should be read by all nurses, and will be found to be most useful to them.

IDLE MOMENTS, By GERALD ISRAELSTAM.
(Routledge, 1917, 1s. net.)

In times of national excitement English feeling seems to find relief in verse, and the present war is already responsible for a considerable number of volumes. Much of our earliest verse is associated with war, and in the atmosphere of the battlefield the earlier instincts and primitive passions seem strangely near. Indeed, Mr. Israelstam's verses now and then recall the direct, somewhat uneven, expression that seems so natural in Brunanburgh, and is also met with in Blake. This very naturalness of expression, and the intimate nearness of the tragedies which it commemorates, make it impossible to judge this war verse by the artificial standards of ordinary criticism; canons of art, like so many other cherished formulæ and accepted traditions, must remain in abeyance *pendente bello*. There is a distinct strain of this primitive poetry in "Dulce Est"—

"Now, Mother, tell me, why does your eye gleam?
So proud a sweet look have I seldom seen.
The world is sad with a mournful, deep grief;
From the Life-tree's fallen many a Leaf.

*My eye is bright, child, with maternal pride,
Which sorrowful feelings within me doth hide.
My son has fallen, gone home to his rest—
He died for our land—we're evermore blest!"*

A too common experience is treated with simple feeling in "Missing," and we catch the right music in this "Whisper of the West Wind"—

"The shells tear through me with giant pace—
My mantle is torn in shreds—
As they journey to their appointed place—
The sweat that gaunt Vulcan sheds."

All the pieces, however, are not of war, and among those that are not, "The Harvest Moon," "The Lost Soul," and "Love's Toll," are good examples, and are quite enough to make us wish to see more of Mr. Israelstam's work later on.

The sixth edition, revised and enlarged, of "Tropical Diseases," by Sir Patrick Manson, G.C.M.G., M.D., F.R.S., is announced for immediate publication by the house of Cassell. In view of the rapid advances that are being made in the study and treatment of tropical diseases, the

author has subjected the book to a thorough revision. The chapter on Mosquitoes and the sections on Tse-tse Flies and Ticks have been brought up to date by Lieut.-Colonel Alcock, C.I.E., F.R.S., of the London School of Tropical Medicine.

THE JEWISH CHILD: ITS HISTORY, FOLKLORE, BIOLOGY, AND SOCIOLOGY. By Wm. Feldman, M.B., B.S. Lond. (London: Ballière, Tindall & Cox. 1917.)

"Dr. Feldman's book on the Jewish child is a work of unique scholarship, of deep scientific insight, of perfect lucidity, and of great literary charm. Learned in all the learnings of the Hebrews, and well versed in modern biology. Dr. Feldman has produced what might be called a medley. But it is a medley instructive and entertaining, showing how Rabbinical and Talmudic precepts anticipated many of the hygienic teachings of to-day, and linking Oriental imagery with statistics and mathematical analysis. It is an historic excursion varied and picturesque, and a philosophical treatise at once simple and profound. It contains, no doubt, drawn from the records of the past, a good deal of archaic physiology, doubtful anthropology, and ethics, not in accord with existing notions; but it contains also a sound exposition of the most recent developments of these subjects."

These words taken from Sir James Crichton Browne's Introduction, are not too high praise of Dr. Feldman's book. It is an attempt, and on the whole a successful one, to give a comprehensive account of all the phases and aspects of Jewish child-life. So wide a view does the author take of his task, that he starts, not from the moment of birth of the child or even from its conception, but by considering in several chapters all the ante-natal circumstances and influences which have a determining influence on the foetus. He then deals with the natal epoch, and finally with the subject-matter proper of the book—the post-natal epochs of infancy, childhood, and puberty. In describing each phase, he begins with the knowledge of the Biblical period and traces it through the Talmudic, Midrashic, and mediæval periods up to the present day. The result is, as Sir James Crichton Browne says, a medley both instructive and entertaining, for the author knows how to lighten the load of his learning by an abundance of amusing anecdote and illustration. Our one criticism would be that it is sometimes difficult to distinguish between the historical and the scientific presentation of the subject; between what was known and believed in ancient times and the teaching

and customs of to-day. This, however, is inevitable from the way the subject is approached, and does not detract from the value and interest of the book which must be regarded as a great achievement, especially when one considers that it was written in the scanty leisure of a busy doctor's life, and amidst the distracting circumstances of the present upheaval. We cordially recommend the book to our readers, and are proud to claim the author as a former pupil of the London Hospital School.

OBITUARY.

He was wounded on September 6th, and died from sepsis on October 17th, at the Duchess of Westminster's Hospital in Paris.

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CAPTAIN (TEMP. LIEUT.-COL.) HAROLD GIBSON,
R.A.M.C.,

was the youngest son of Surgeon-Lieut.-Colonel G. J. Gibson, R.A.M.C. (retired), of Totnes, Devon. He was born on September 21st, 1884, at Kamptee, Central India, and received his medical education at the "London," qualifying L.R.C.P.Lond., M.R.C.S.Eng., in April, 1907. He obtained a commission as lieutenant in the R.A.M.C. on July 29th, 1907, being promoted to the rank of captain on January 29th, 1911. After leaving the Hospital he served at Plymouth and Portsmouth, and later proceeded to India, serving at Jhansi, Kamptee, Rawal Pinde and Peshawar. Prior to his death he was acting as Temp. Lieut.-Colonel in charge of a Field Ambulance in France, and took part in all the recent advances—Albert, Fricourt, Messines, La Fere, &c. Captain Gibson took an active interest in the Students' Clubs Union during the period he was at the Hospital, being a member of the Rugby, Football, Hockey and Fives Clubs.



CAPTAIN JAMES ERNEST STUDHOLME WILSON,
M.C., R.A.M.C.,

who died of wounds on August 23rd, at the age of 31, was the elder son of the late Rev. Studholme Wilson, for many years Rector of Millbrook, Southampton, and Mrs. Wilson, of Stoneleigh, Newport, Salop. He received his general education at Summerfields, near Oxford, and at Radley, and his medical education at Southampton and the "London," qualifying M.R.C.S.Eng., L.R.C.P.Lond., in 1911. He entered practice at Iver, Bucks, where he was Medical Officer to the local Cottage Hospital and to the Alexandra House Home for Feeble-minded Girls. Early in December, 1915, he joined the Army as lieutenant R.A.M.C., and was attached to the Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry. He went abroad with his battalion in the following May, being gazetted captain on June 4th, 1916. Towards the end of 1916 he was awarded the Military Cross, "for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during operations. He went up to the front line from his aid post through a very heavy barrage in order to assist the wounded, and by his pluck and skill he undoubtedly saved many lives. He afterwards controlled the evacuation of the casualties under heavy fire." His colonel writes:—"How much we shall all miss him, you can perhaps understand better than I can tell you. He was hit early in the evening, but insisted on going on with his work for six hours after he was wounded. Our admiration for his gallantry and devotion to duty knows no bounds. His name will be a lasting and inspiring memory to the officers and men of this battalion."

Captain Wilson married in 1912 Marjory, daughter of the late Thomas Ireland, of Mossley Hill, Liverpool, and leaves a widow and a son.

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CAPTAIN ANTHONY TRAILL, M.B.Ch.B. (Oxon),
R.A.M.C.,

who died at a casualty clearing station in France on August 25th, after a few days' illness, was 27 years of age, and the second son of Edmund B. Traill, of Pebmarsh, Essex, and Chiru, Traill, Argentina. He was born near Dublin, and educated at Charterhouse and New College, Oxford. While at Oxford he became President of the O.U.L.T.C., and won the challenge cup. He attended special courses at the "London" between 1911 and 1913, but the greater portion of his medical education was received at Oxford University and Guy's Hospital, from where he obtained his medical degrees in 1915. In February, 1916, he received a commission in the Royal Army Medical Corps, and went to the front in the early part of the year. During his period of study at Oxford he had a severe attack of hæmorrhage from a duodenal ulcer, and it was a recurrence of this trouble while attached to a regiment which was the cause of his untimely death.

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PRIVATE ROBERT WRIGHT.

We are very sorry to hear from Mrs. Robert Wright that her husband was killed on the 16th August. He was a stretcher-bearer in the R.A.M.C., and when engaged, during the last advance in Flanders, in rescuing the wounded, was struck by a portion of shell in the back of the head and was killed instantly. His comrades brought him in and buried him in the Military Cemetery near

Ypres. He was a splendid servant, silent, sharp, and a thoroughly hard, conscientious worker, never requiring to be told anything twice. He leaves a small daughter as well as a widow.

CORRESPONDENCE

52nd Casualty Clearing Station,
Mingozo, East Africa.

September 17th, 1917.

MY DEAR DR. WRIGHT,

This is about the fourth letter I have attempted to get off to you since I left England in the beginning of 1915. Since then I have wandered about a little bit. As you know, I went out with the 15th General Hospital, and in September, '15, I exchanged with an elderly man to go to Suvla, got to Mudros, and stayed for a time in the Details Camp there, then got on the *Caledonia* with patients for Devonport. R. J. Lowe was one of the M.O.'s. We weren't allowed past Gibraltar, where we had to leave our patients, then returned to Details Camp, Mudros, where I found P. H. Bahr, Reeves Johnston. From there I was sent to this unit, and remained with them in West Mudros until the evacuation. There the O.C. of this unit was an old "Londoner," C. O. P. Cooke. We came back to Alexandria, where I met any number of old London men. Then, in April last year, we sailed for East Africa, and landed at Kilindine, 2nd of May, pushed on to the advanced base, New Moshi, and remained unopened for about a fortnight, when the advance started. We then moved on to Kahe, and from there I followed up the 3rd Division in charge of a sort of advanced dressing station, until we took Hundeni, in June. I returned to the unit there, and was left with railhead party. I was in charge until August, when we all joined the main unit. After about a week I went on again with an advanced dressing station into Morogovo, where I arrived on September 2nd. There I stayed with the main unit until December. In Morogovo we had a small London Dinner in October; there were five of us—Wollaston, Mulvaney, Dolbey, Varvill, and myself. In Morogovo we were practically doing general hospital work, with the personnel and equipment of a clearing station, so you may imagine we were busy.

I went on in December and took over a small post hospital at Mikesse, and in January I went further forward towards the Rufy. Lately I have been out with a regiment, and was sent in

sick a few days ago, but am getting along splendidly now, and hope to be fit in a very short while.

Out here I have at various times come across Heale, Sharpe, Atkinson, one Evans who was at the London about 1896 or thereabouts, Colonel Field, Johnson, Tothill, Haji. In Egypt I saw quite a lot of Clive Smith after the evacuation.

I am glad to see by the GAZETTE which I received the other day (for which and the others I received many thanks), that Carroll is qualified. If you see him, please congratulate him for me. I believe he owes me a letter.

I am afraid I am a poor letter-writer, so with my best wishes and many thanks for the GAZETTES I must close.

DEAR DR. WRIGHT,

I feel that I ought to have written long ere this, if only to say how much the issues of the GAZETTE are appreciated. They remind us of happy days in the past, and when one or two "Londoners" meet, the latest edition is produced and its pages are discussed with profit and pleasure.

There are quite a number of contemporaries out here, some of whom I have met. MacMullan is in one of the ships, and should, with any luck, be coming home shortly. I met Sharpe and Atkinson some weeks ago; I believe they have been since invalided with malaria. Tothill is attached to the West Indian Regiment, and keeps very fit. Pearson is on shore at one of the hospitals. I often see A. P. R. Wollaston, who has been ashore all the time. Before leaving the *Swiftsure*, I met Whyte, and we were able to foregather occasionally when the ships were in company.

I am afraid the censorship does not permit of writing at length, unfortunately; one has to choose one's words with discretion. Work in a small ship is not very varied; an odd fever with occasional boils and blains form the majority of my cases. A ship is the healthiest place to be in, on this coast. For the rest, one's ambition is to return to hospital at a future date, and do some post-graduate work.

I had a letter from you forwarded on to me some time ago asking for my whereabouts, but was only reminded of the fact that I had not answered it by receiving a very welcome copy of the GAZETTE this morning.

I am afraid I have nothing of much interest to tell you, as after spending 18 months in France I had an unfortunate *tête-à-tête* with a Minenwerfer, resulting in a badly comminuted femur and other injuries, which have kept me in hospital for the last 18 months, during which time familiarity with the surgeon's knife has almost, but not quite, bred a contempt for it. I hope, however, to be convalescent after Xmas, and to come back to the "London" to qualify, as I am afraid I shall not be passed for active service again.

While in hospital at Calais I was fortunate enough to come under the charge of J. D. Driberg, but apart from him I have not met many "Londoners" of late.

DEAR DR. WRIGHT,

As you may be seeing my name in the casualty list soon, I am writing to say that on the afternoon of the 12th I had just gone outside my aid-post (a German "pill-box") to see to the evacuation of wounded, when a shell burst just behind me and sent me flying. I fell with left leg twisted under me, and a simple fracture of the femur. Thank God there were no external wounds to go septic. It is marvellous how the shell fragments missed me. Most providentially an M.O. from our field ambulance had just come up to see me, so I had expert treatment at once, with a very good splint. The X-ray shows the femur to be in very good position, so I ought to do well. I had a good journey down, and am now most comfortable in No. 14 General Hospital.

When I returned from leave last month I found myself in your brother's Army Corps, but as Corps Headquarters were at some distance from our camp, I was not able to get over to see him.

The GAZETTE came to hand just before we moved up the line, and I became a casualty, so it will give me some enjoyable reading as soon as my kit arrives.

I see that F. E. Johnson was mentioned as wounded in a recent casualty list.

DEAR DR. WRIGHT,

It has been very good of you to keep sending the HOSPITAL GAZETTE. They are always most interesting—even though all or most of our own contemporaries are scattered all over the world just now. I keep running across some of them now and then—Hartgill, on the leave boat some time ago; Hutchence, who is now with some Oxford and Bucks; Porrit, I was told, was with an ambulance in the same division; also H. G. Winter, but I didn't have a chance of seeing them.

I have been with this battalion nine months now, and we have had some pretty heavy fighting during that time. On the whole, I think it is about the best job of any, and certainly appeals to me much more strongly than field ambulance work. The only drawback, and it certainly is a great one, is that a fair proportion of friends become casualties after you have known them for a few months or even weeks. But this must be so if you are going in for a really big show, I suppose. My stretcher-bearers have done extraordinarily well all through. They are naturally a fairly tough lot, for they were miners in pre-war days, and miners they still remain to all outward appearance. I have tried on several occasions to teach them the rudiments of first aid, and most of them have had some practical experience of accidents in the pits. But they reject with scorn the anatomy without names and physiology "without tears," which I have tried to din into their thick heads. But when we

come to the real business, they do the most extraordinary things in the most matter-of-fact, phlegmatic way, and their language becomes more lurid in proportion to the shelling. I can bear the highest testimony to the good work done by ambulance bearers for months together on the Somme and in Flanders this summer. In a big show the bearers cannot possibly be everywhere at the same time, and the worried R.M.O., with numerous bad cases on his hands, and a seemingly ceaseless flow of more coming down hour by hour, naturally at times gets restive.

I had a great time on one occasion of this kind. The battalion was well into the old enemy trenches, and I had a large collection of bad cases stowed away in concrete emplacements, all non-starters. But just when things were beginning to look desperate, a swarm of Bosche prisoners appeared on their way to captivity and shepherded along by three of our men. We rounded up 80 or so of these, split them up into sqads of four; they proceeded on their way with my wounded, and the long procession disappeared over the ridge. I heard afterwards that they arrived safely. A Bosche officer, one of the prisoners, refused to work, but rapidly swallowed his pride when someone wagged a bayonet at him in a suggestive manner.

I hope the London has escaped any injury from bombs. However, I'm afraid they must have been fairly close now and then. It has long been a secret ambition of mine to blast Bethnal Green and such places with heavy artillery, and "mould them nearer to the heart's desire,"—though one would like to clear the places of inhabitants before commencing. The Huns may eventually help in this direction, if they persevere, though I don't accuse them of entertaining any scheme for the better housing of East Enders.

I hope you are quite fit. Please remember me to any of my generation who are still with you, though I greatly fear there are none.

DEAR DR. WRIGHT.

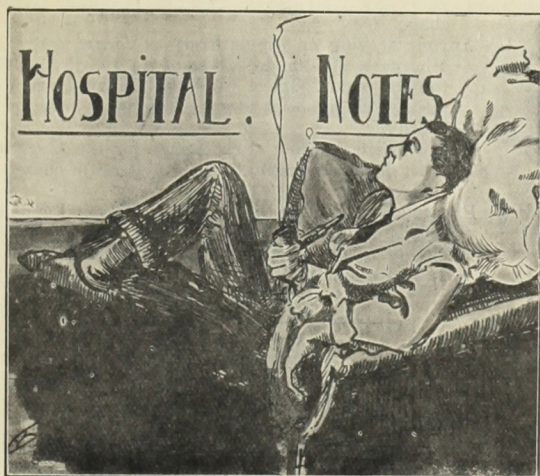

So we carry on with an ever-changing populace, which makes it all the harder for the permanent staff. Still no one grouses more than is to be expected, but just—"Carry on"!

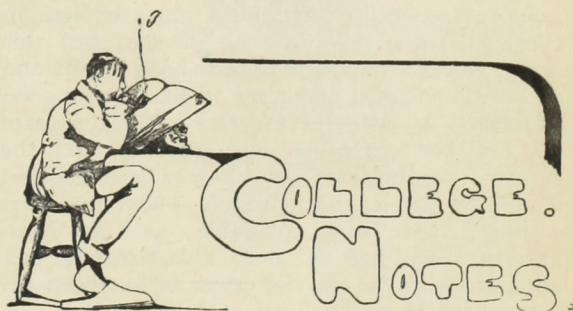
The residents' billiards handicap was won by Forshaw. Twort being beaten in the final.

THE LONDON HOSPITAL MEDICAL CLUB

The Medical Agency for Appointments

The Medical Agency was started in 1907 by the London Hospital Medical Club, for the benefit of "Londoners" past and present, and since then a large number of men have availed themselves of its services. The Agency is superintended by the Registrars, with the advice of a Sub-Committee of the Club.

At a Meeting of the Council of the Club on March 15th, 1910, it was decided that certain fees should be charged. A list of these can be obtained from the Registrars. For appointments as *locum tenens* they are as follows:—

- (a) If for a longer period than a week—
 - Members of the Club, 2½ per cent. on amount earned, with a minimum fee of 5/-.
 - Non-members, 5 per cent., minimum fee 7/6.
- (b) If for one week or less—
 - A fee of 5/- to be paid by the Principal.
 - For appointments of less than one week no fee is charged to the *locum tenens*.
 - For appointments of more than one week no fee is charged to the Principal.

The proceeds of the Agency, after the deduction of expenses, will be paid to the London Hospital Medical Club to be used for benevolent purposes.

The new regulations came into force on July 1st, 1910.

- (b) Anyone seeking an appointment as *locum tenens* or otherwise, should add his name to the list kept in the Registrars' Office. Information will be sent by post or telegraph, as soon as a suitable position is heard of.

Men who are entering their names for the first time must do so personally to the Registrar in charge of the Agency.

- (c) Particulars of practices, partnerships, Hospital appointments, etc., can be obtained from the Registrar in charge of the Agency, who can be seen daily at 12 o'clock in the Registrars' Office.
